

# Waltham Community Demographics

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Introduction

This report is on the statistical area Waltham. The boundaries are depicted below.

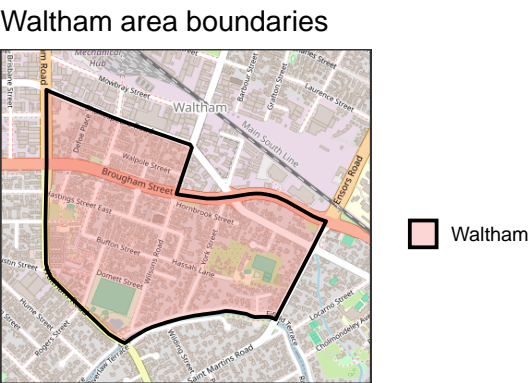


Figure 1: Boundaries of statistical areas in your community. If this doesn't look like your community, please get in contact! Note that more densely populated statistical areas may be geographically small and difficult to see, particularly if larger areas are also included.

Individual data

Population size and growth/decline

Altogether, 2,169 people live in Waltham. The population of Waltham increased by 33.9% between 2013 and 2023, compared to an increase of 17.7% in Aotearoa.

With regards to gender, in Waltham, a total of 1,059 (48.8%) people identified as male/tāne; 1,086 (50.1%) identified as female/wahine; and 24 (1.1%) identified as another gender/he ira kē anō. Overall, in Aotearoa New Zealand, 49.3% identified as male/tāne; 50.3% identified as female/wahine; and 0.4% identified as another gender/he ira kē anō.

## Age of usual residents

The median ages of people in your community are as follows: Waltham: 33.5. In contrast, the median age in Aotearoa is 38.1.

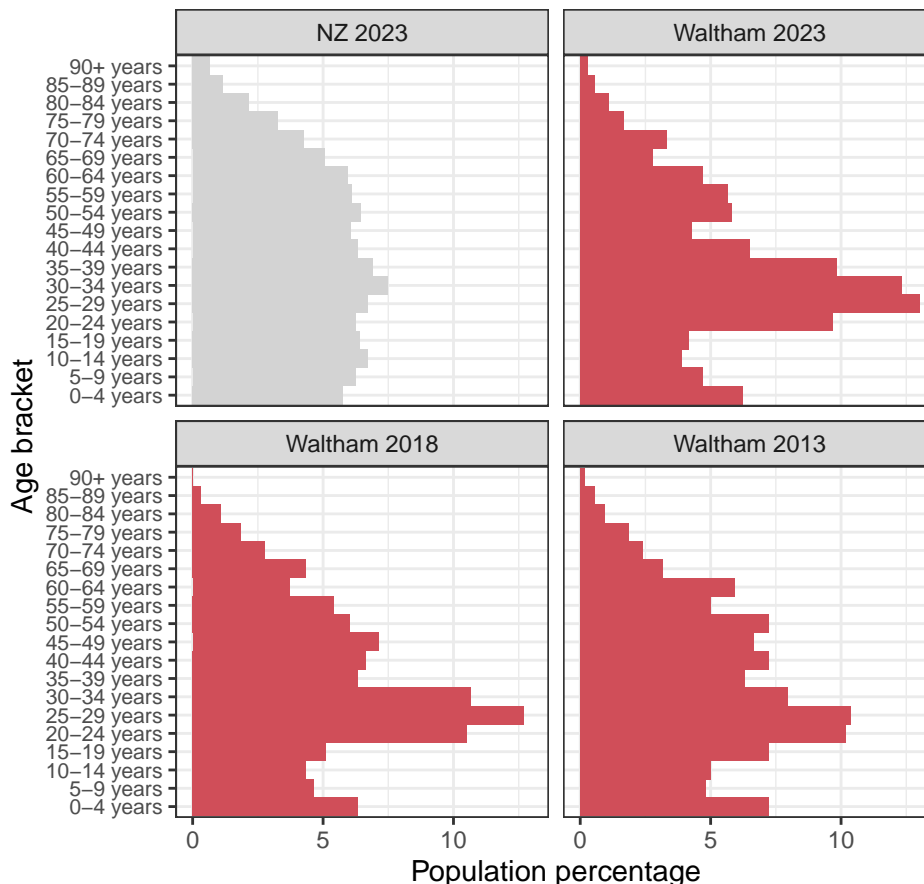


Figure 2: Population pyramids for your community, and for NZ in 2023.

## Transience

While some communities have stable populations, others are quite transient. These graphs show how long people have lived in your community and where they usually lived five years ago (i.e where they were living in 2018).

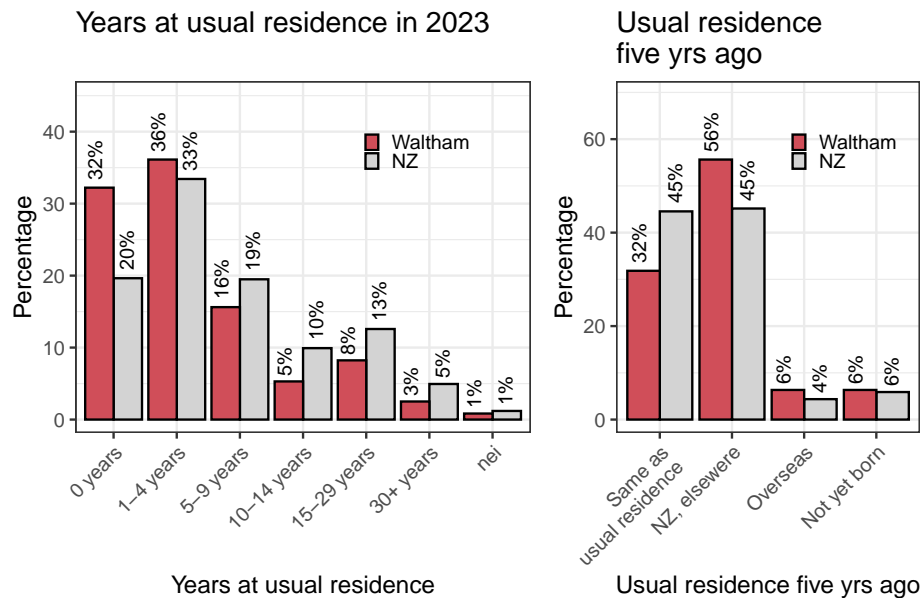


Figure 3: Transience in your community, as measured by years an individual has lived in their current home, and their residence five years ago

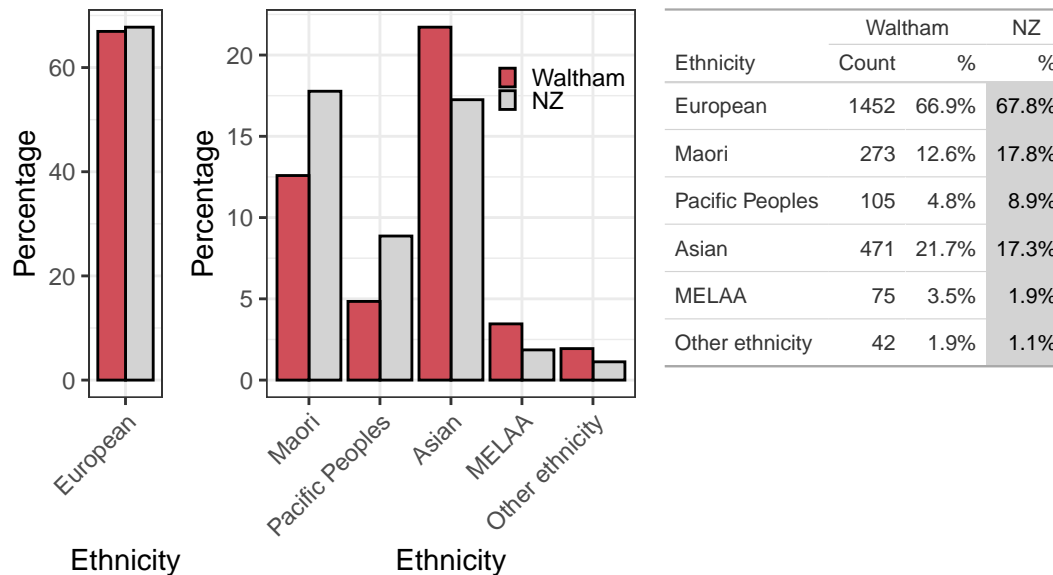


Figure 4: Ethnic makeup of your community, and in NZ in 2023. People can select more than one option, and therefore the total can sum to more than 100%. MELAA=Middle Eastern/Latin American/African. Note the different axes used for European and other ethnicities.

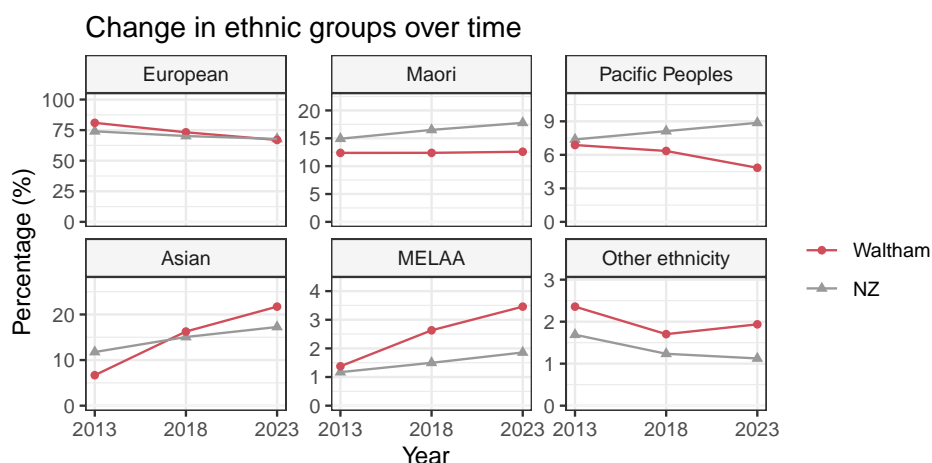
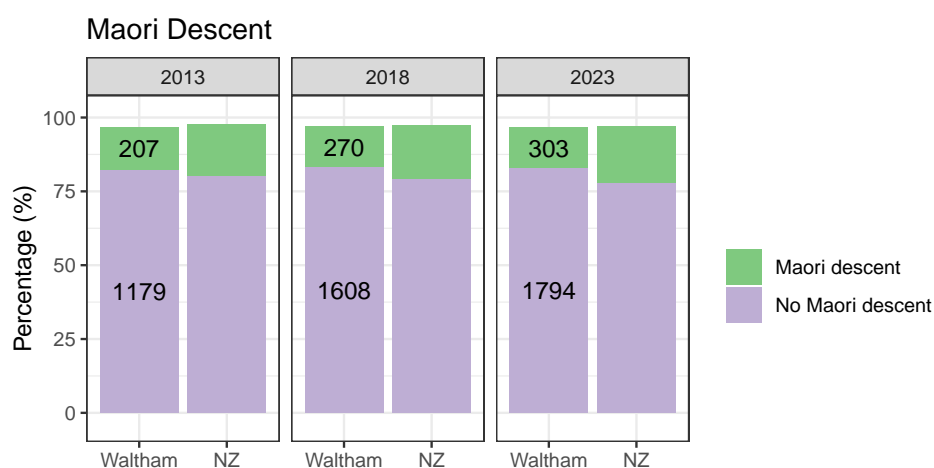


Figure 5: Ethnic makeup of your community, and in NZ over time. Note that the scales are different for each plot, to highlight trends over time instead of absolute population sizes.

Figure 6: Total number, and proportions, of people of Māori descent in 2013, 2018, and 2023.

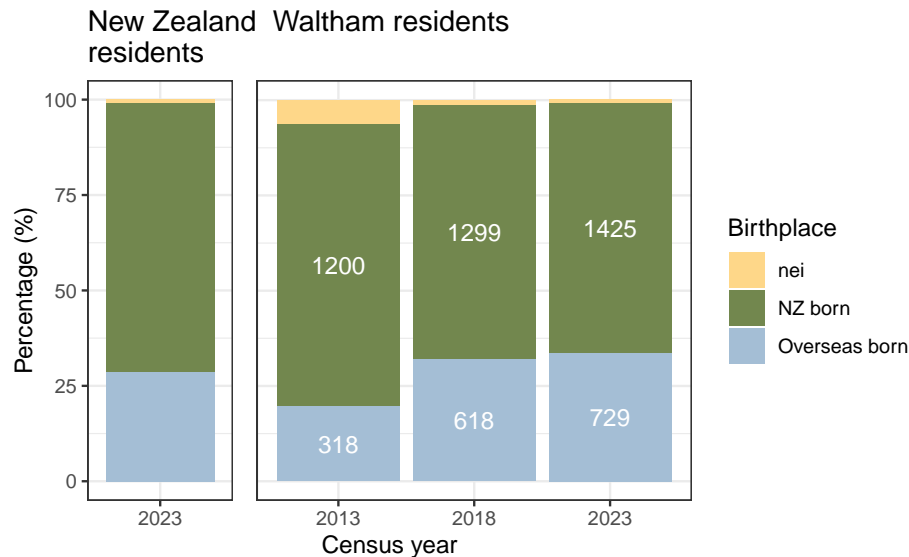

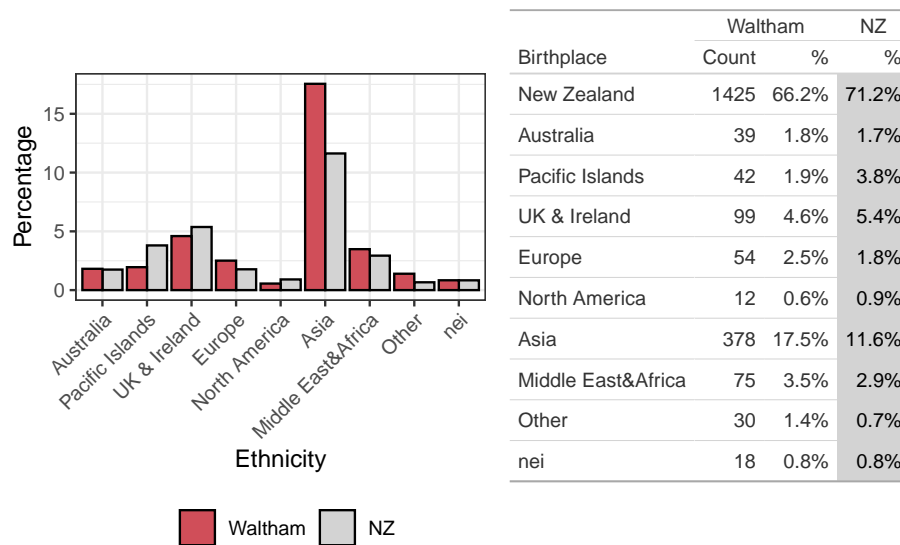


Figure 8: Birthplace of members your community, and in NZ in 2023. People can select more than one option, and therefore the total can sum to more than 100%. 'Europe' count excludes people born in the UK or Ireland.

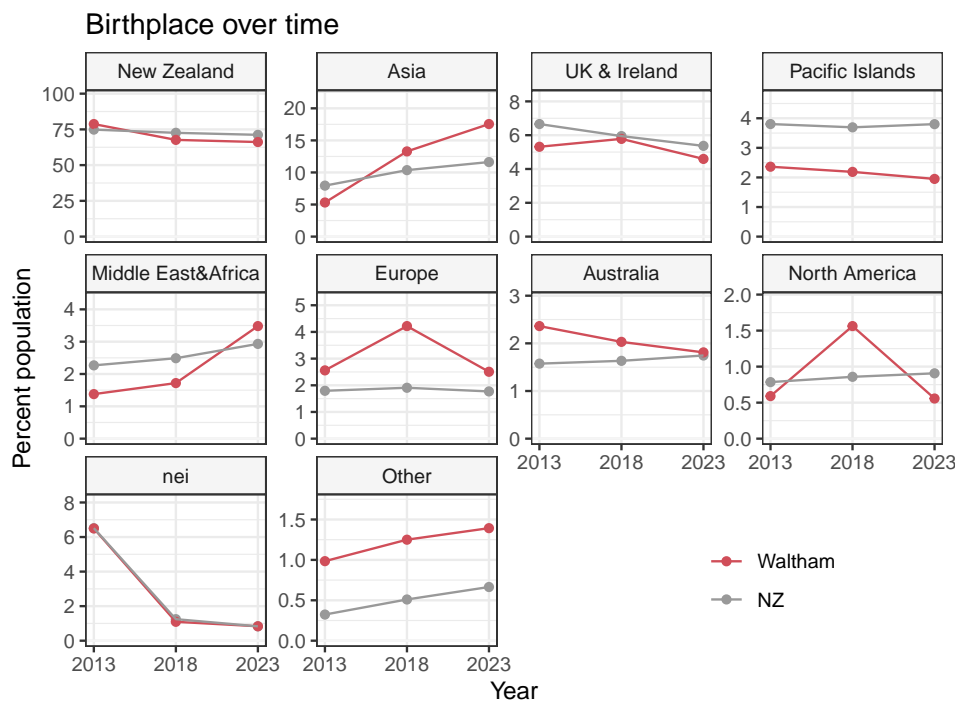


Figure 9: Birthplace of residents of your community, and in NZ over time. Note that the scales are different for each plot, to highlight trends over time instead of absolute population sizes.

## Relationship status and partnership status

The 2023 census measured both legally registered relationship status, and social partnership status. People in New Zealand can enter into two types of legally registered relationships: marriage and civil union. In contrast, partnership status includes people living together as part of a *de facto* relationship. Note that partnership status was only measured for New Zealand residents aged 15 and above. 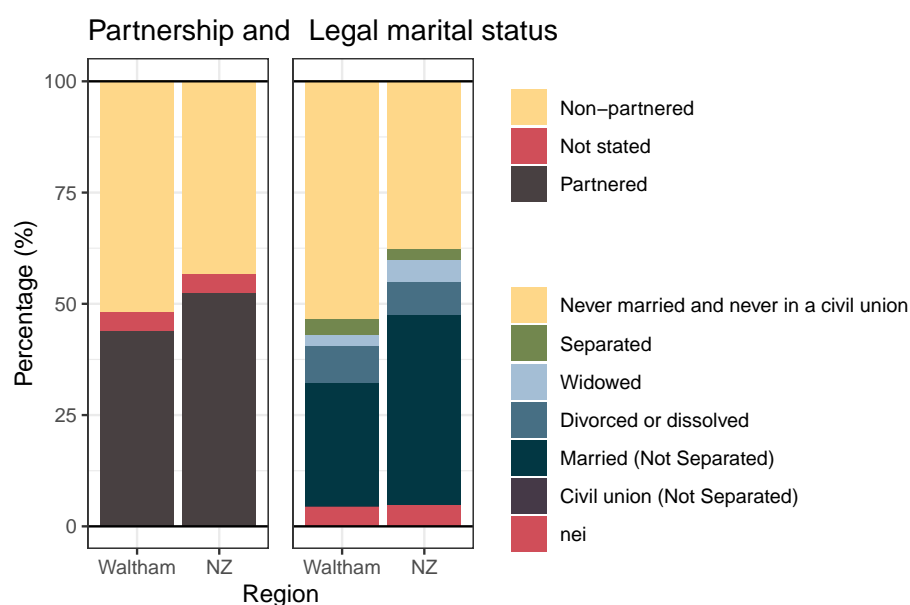


Figure 10: Legal marital status, and partnership status, in your community in 2023.

## Qualifications and study

The New Zealand census also measures study participation, and highest educational attainment. “Study” is defined as participating in any sort of education or training: from early childhood education to school, to tertiary education (e.g. university) and other places of training.

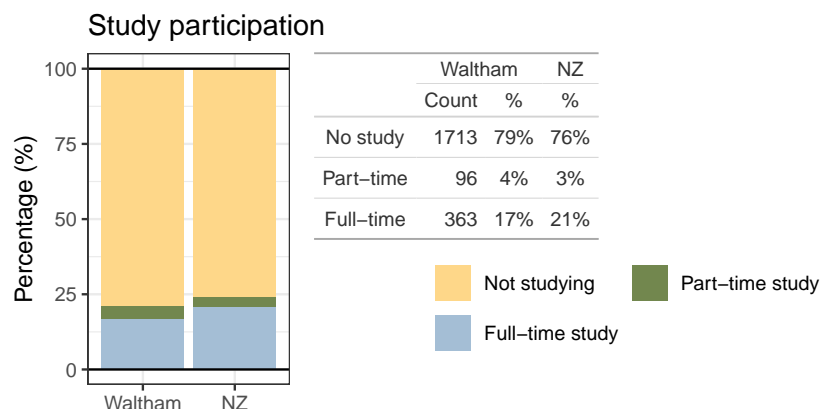


Figure 11: Study participation for people in your community. Full time study is study for more than 20 hours per week. This data includes respondents of all ages, including children aged 0-14 years.

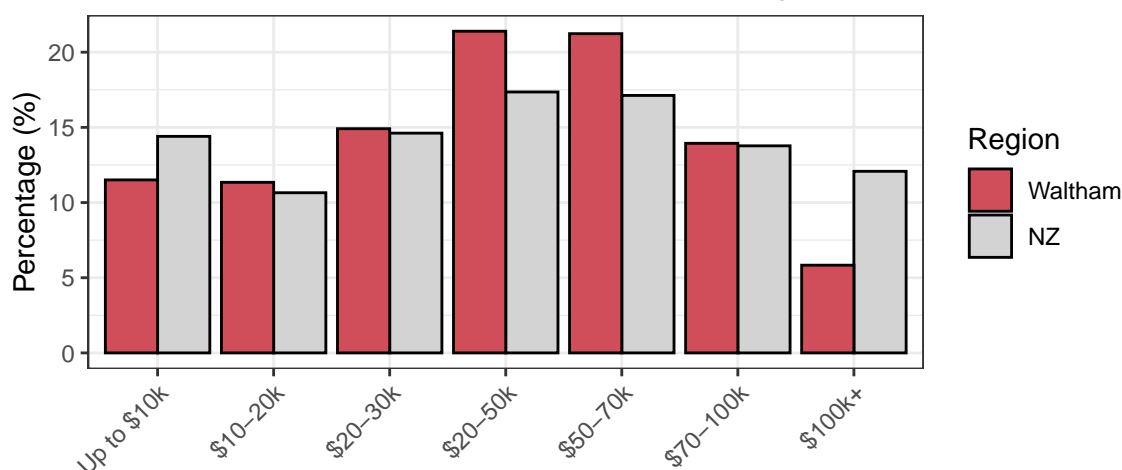


Figure 12: Distribution of personal incomes in your community.

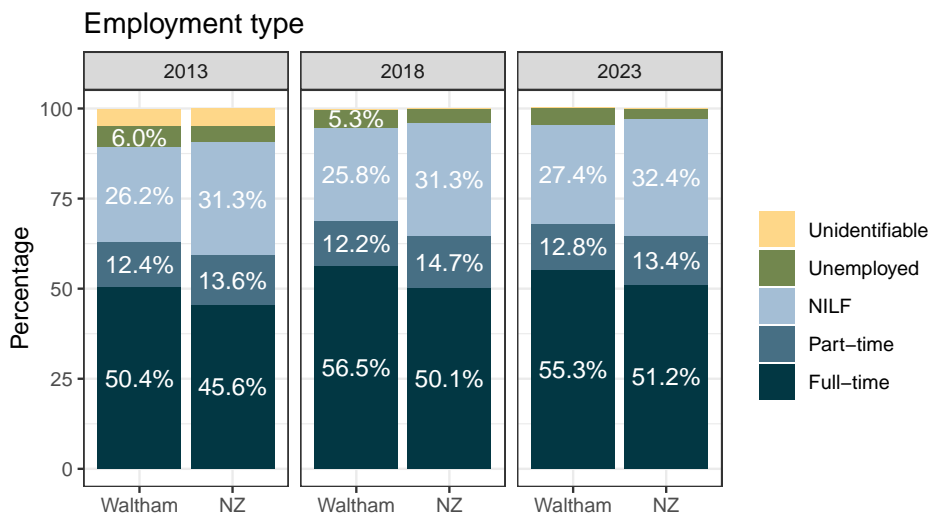


Figure 13: Employment status in your community. Percentages are drawn onto the graph; for clarity, values less than 5% are not given. NILF not in labour force.

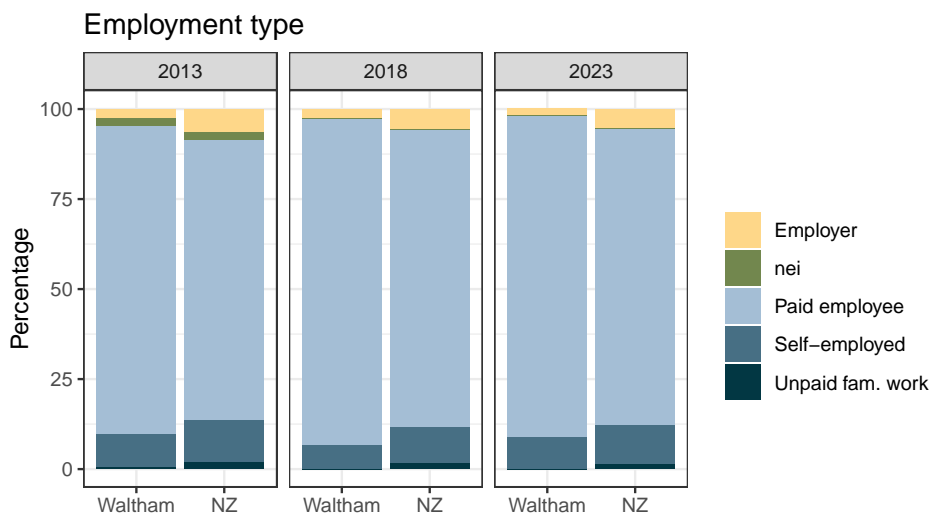


Figure 14: Employment type for people living in your community. nei: not otherwise indicated.

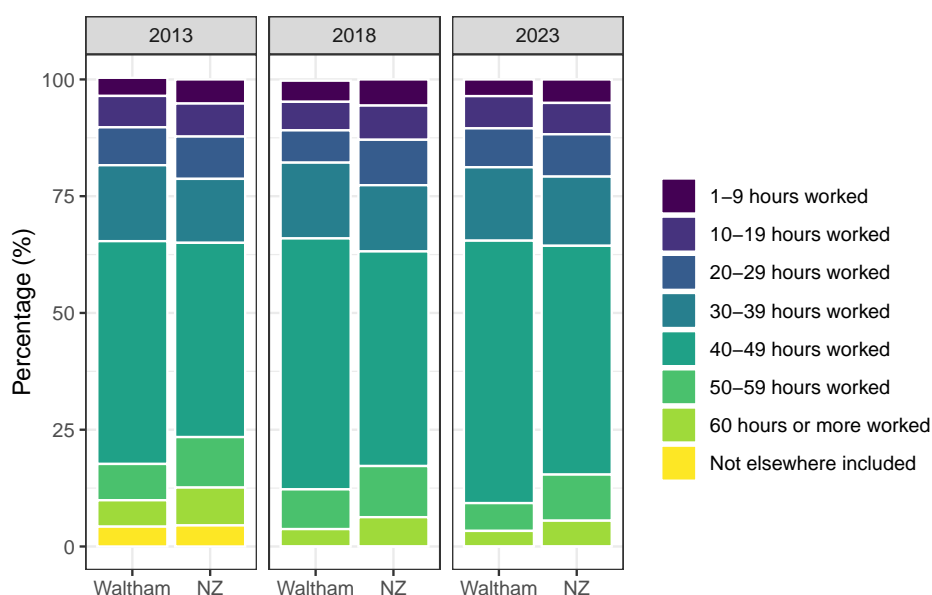


Figure 15: Hours of paid work by people living in your community

In New Zealand overall, working from home rates increased from 11.9% of workers in 2018 to 17.7% of workers in 2023, largely as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic.<sup>1</sup> Work from home rates may have decreased in your community since 2023 due to changing government and workplace policies.

People in your community are also likely to participate in unpaid work, whether volunteering in a community organization, caring for a family member, or maintaining their own household.

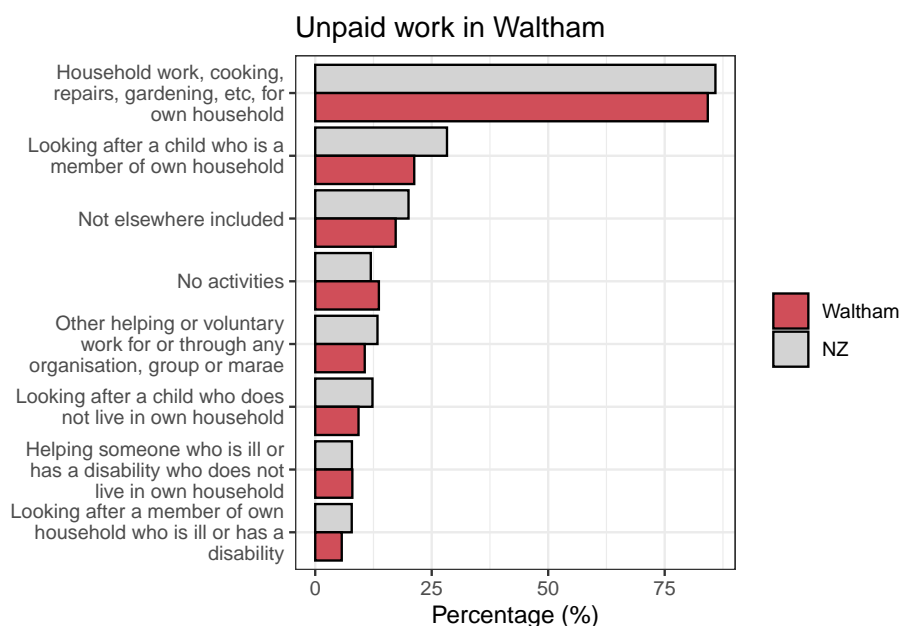


Figure 16: Percentage of members of your community participating in various types of unpaid work.

## Families

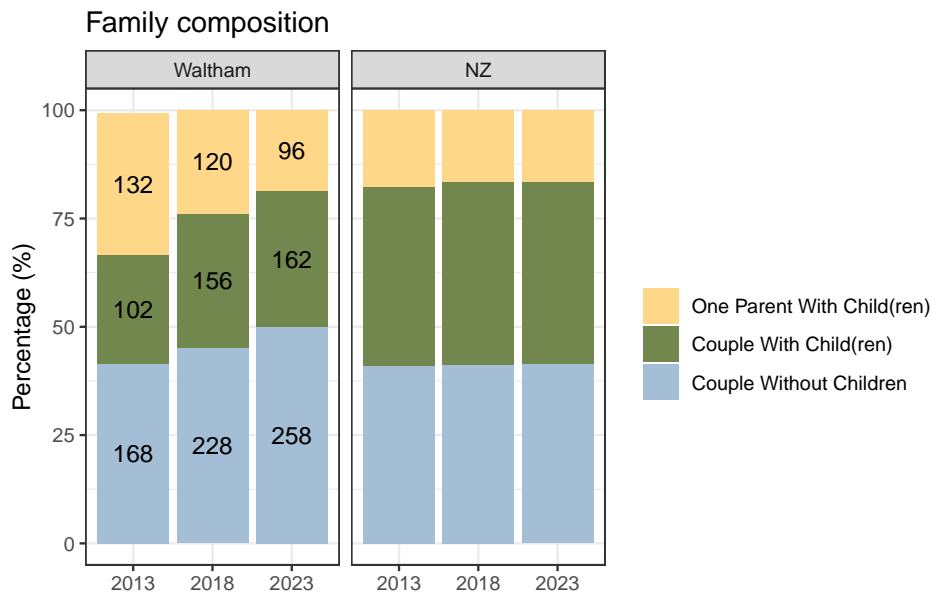


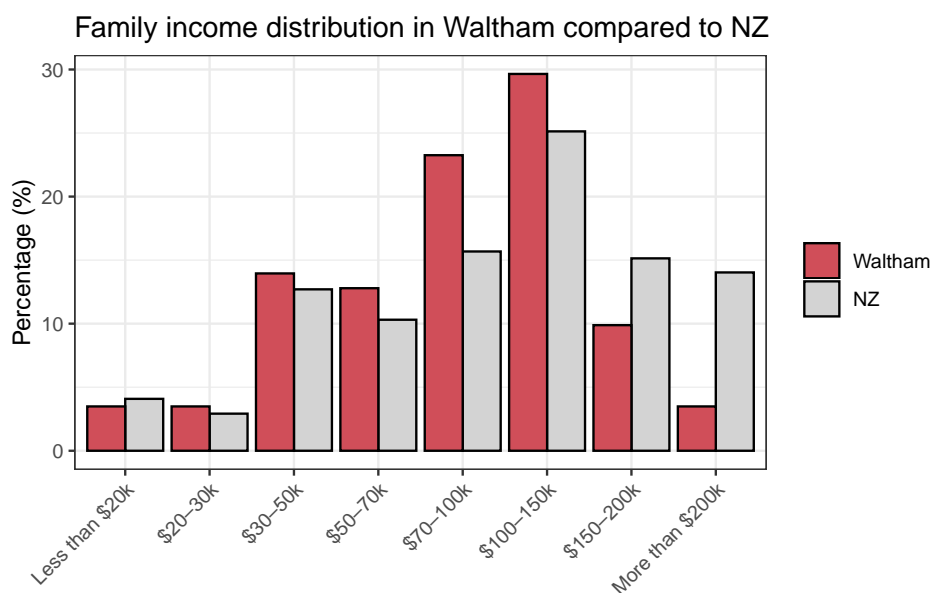
Figure 17: Composition of families in your community.

## Family finances

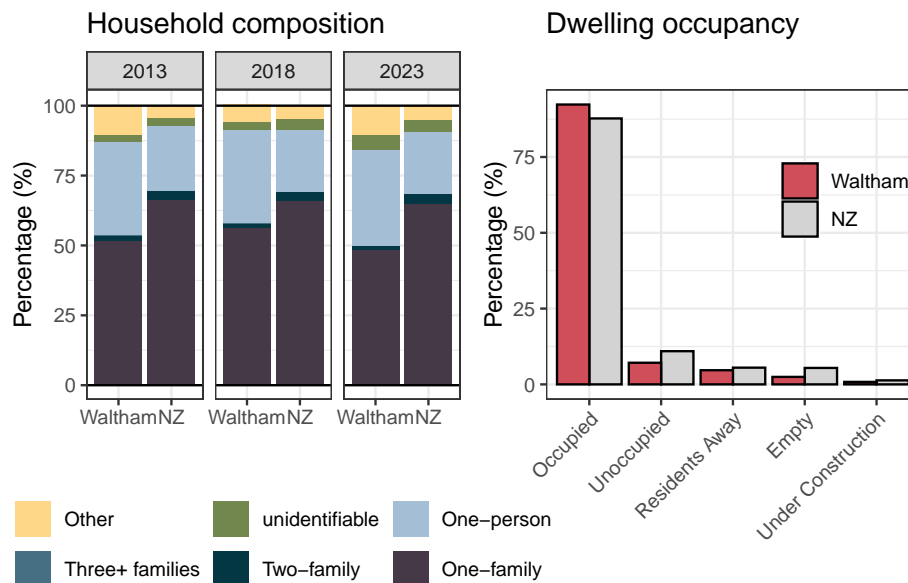


Figure 18: Household composition, and dwelling occupancy, in your community. Unoccupied dwellings can be classified as either Empty or Residents Away, depending on whether residents are expected to return soon after census night. (Both are shown here, along with the unoccupied total.)

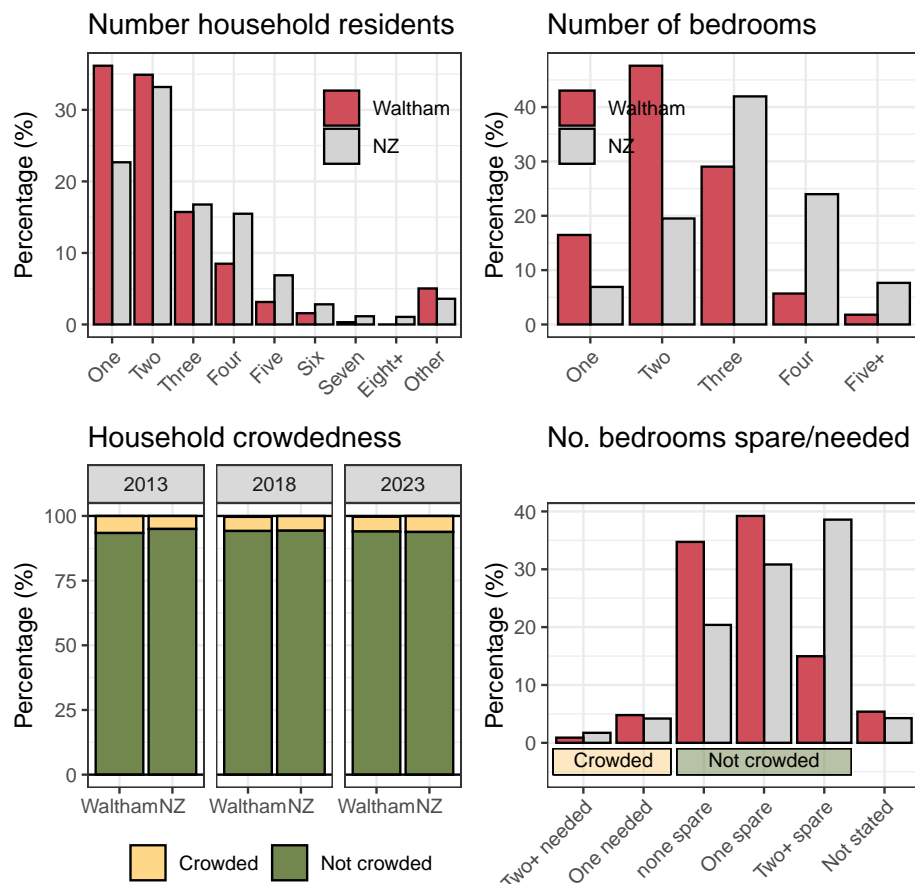
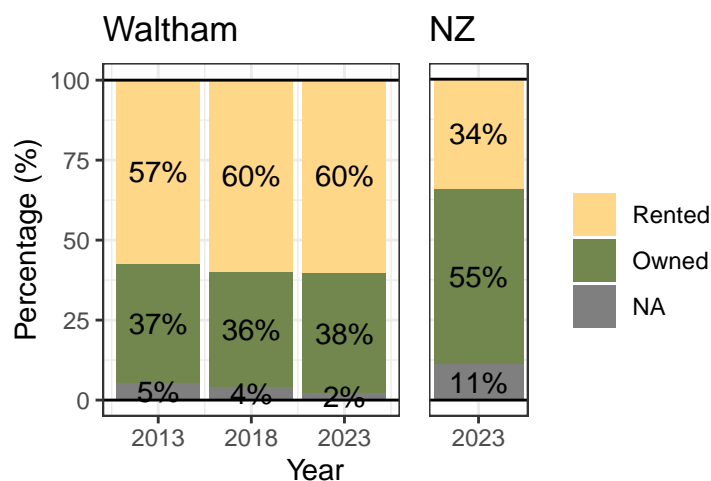


Figure 19: Extent of household crowding in your community. Crowdedness is defined based on the number of bedrooms spare, or needed, in the dwelling.

## Rent and housing affordability

Rents have increased markedly over the past decade. Median weekly rentals are now \$450 in Aotearoa. Figure 21 shows how rents have changed over time in your community.

## Dampness and access to amenities

Since 2018, the Census has recorded the existence of dampness and mould in dwellings in New Zealand. Living in damp and mouldy housing impacts health and wellbeing, particularly for children.

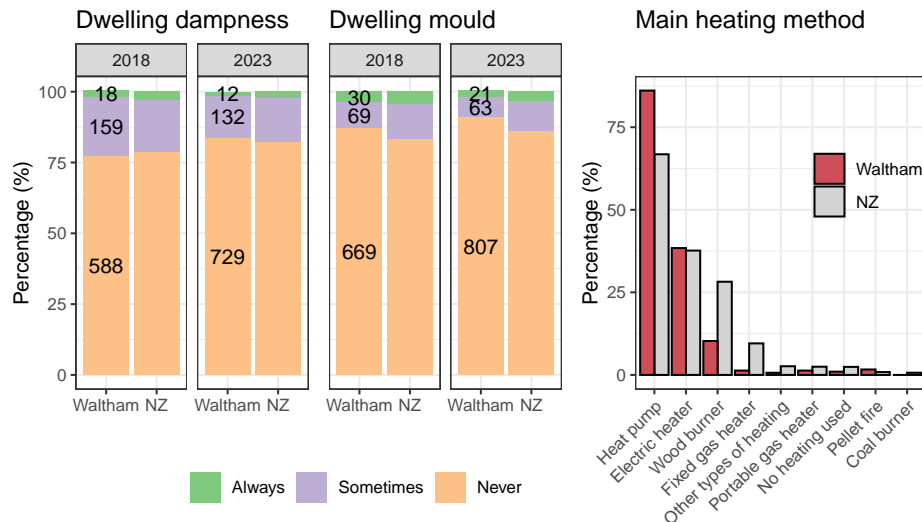


Figure 22: Dwelling mould, dampness, and main heating method, for dwellings in your community. Mould is defined as being present if there is always or sometimes mould covering a surface larger than an A4 piece of paper.

Households in your community may or may not have access to telecommunications, and a motor vehicle.

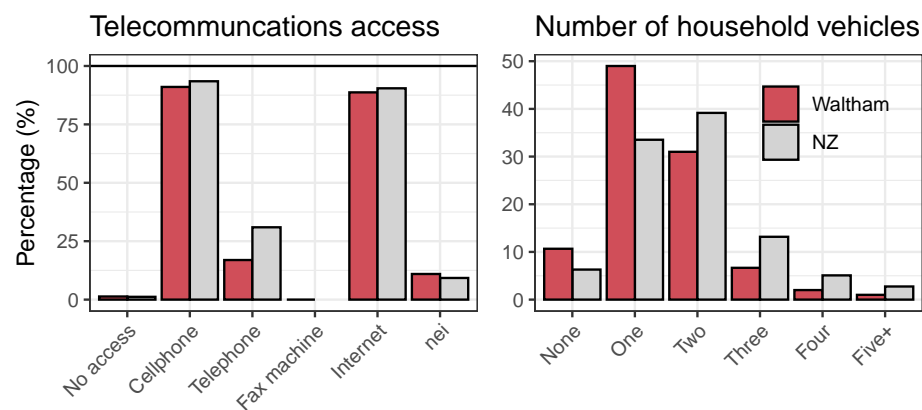


Figure 23: Access to household amenities in your community. Note that motor vehicles include any vehicle used on a public road; they do not need to be mechanically operational or with a current warrant of fitness. They do not include farm vehicles not licensed for road use, or motorbikes and scooters.
